

BRIGG, or GLANFORD BRIGG, is a neat, well-built, and thriving market town, on the navigable river Ancholme, in a broad level vale of rich and well drained cars, bounded on the east and west by the woody and highly cultivated acclivities of the Cliffs and Wolds. It has a *Station* on the rails from Gainsborough to Grimsby and New Holland. It is distant 10 miles S. by W. of Barton, 9 miles W.N.W. of Caistor, 23 miles N. by E. of Lincoln, 16 miles S.S.W. of Hull, and 9 miles S. of the Humber, from which the Ancholme is navigable to Bishop Bridge, 10 miles above Brigg, and 5 miles from Market Rasen; and by a branch cut to Moorton, 3½ miles from Caistor. The *township* and *chapelry* of Brigg is in the *parish* and *manor* of *Wrawby*, and contains nearly 2000 acres of land. Its *population* amounted, in 1801, to 1327; in 1811, to 1361; in 1821, to 1674; in 1831, to 1780; and in 1851, to 2201; but the *Town* extends into three other parishes, and its total number of inhabitants is upwards of 3000, of whom about 600 are on the west side of the river, in Broughton and Scawby parishes, and about 300 in the north-eastern suburbs, are in Wrawby township. The etymology of *Glanford* is unknown, but it may perhaps be a corruption of *Clampford*, from the *clamps*, or planks of timber, laid down in ancient times across the *ford* and its swampy approaches, where a good road and strong stone bridge were subsequently constructed. It is in some legal documents and other writings called *Glamford Briggs*. After the erection of the bridge, the town obtained the name of Brigg. It was formerly only a small fishing hamlet; but since the improvement and extension of the Ancholme navigation, and the drainage of the cars in the vale of that river, about the commencement of the present century, it has been continually increasing in trade, commerce, buildings, and population. The navigation was considerably improved in 1820, so as to admit vessels of 80 tons burden as high as Bishop Bridge in the 6th of George IV. the *Commissioners of the Navigation and the drainage of the Ancholme Level*, obtained an Act for altering and enlarging the powers of two Acts, passed in the reign of George III. for draining the cars and other low lands, and for making certain parts of the river Ancholme navigable. The navigation tolls produce about £800, and the drainage tax about £1400 per annum. Mr. Adam Smith is the *engineer*. The *Ancholme Valley* had formerly many monasteries and recluse cells, and its name is supposed by some to have been derived from the numerous *Anchorites* who lived there in monastic times. Much business is done at Brigg in corn, coal, and timber; and here are several corn mills, a ropery, two tan and fellmongers' yards, several malt kilns, three breweries and two extensive millwright and machine works. The town was formerly very extensively engaged in dressing *rabbit skins* and *fur*, but this trade has considerably declined since the enclosure of most of the large *warrens* of Lincolnshire. Several of the inhabitants are owners of small trading vessels, and *packets* sail daily with passengers to Ferriby Sluice, to meet the Hull steamers. The *market*, held every Thursday, is numerously attended, and well supplied with corn and all sorts of provisions. Here is a large *fair* for horses, cattle, and sheep, on the 5th of August, and a hiring for servants on the Friday before Old May-day. The Market place has many good shops, &c., and under the *Town Hall* is the *Butter market*. The CORN EXCHANGE is a handsome brick building, erected in 1849, at the cost of £2000, raised in £10 shares. It is 90 feet long, and 47 wide, and has a large News Room. The old *Gas Works*, established in 1886, have given place to more extensive Gas Works, erected in 1840, at the cost of about £3500, raised in £25 shares. In 1852, C. C. Elwes, Esq., the lord of the manor, and owner of many houses in the town, obtained an act of parliament for the establishment of *Water Works*, from which the town has now a good supply of excellent water from *St. Anyan's spring*, in Wrawby township. The *Wharf Well*, at the end of the town, had previously been used by the inhabitants for more than a century, as their chief supply for domestic use. *Brigg Horticultural Society* has a numerous list of members, and holds its shows of fruit, vegetables, &c., at the Corn Exchange.

GLANFORD BRIGG UNION extends over 165,470 acres of land, and had 83,786 inhabitants in 1851. It comprises 51 parishes and townships, for which a WORKHOUSE was erected, in 1837, in Wrawby township, with room for more than 250 inmates, though it had only 188 in 1841, and 218 in 1851, when the census was taken. The total average annual expenditure of the 51 parishes, &c., during the three years previous to the formation of the Union, was £10,547. In 1838, their expenditure was £7,110, but during the half year ending March, 1850, it amounted to £6504. The Board of Guardians meets on alternate Thursdays. Sir Robert Sheffield, Bart., is the *chairman*. John Hett, Esq., is the *union clerk and superintendent registrar*; the Rev. J. R. West, *chaplain*; Messrs. A. M. Sergeant, B. L. Dixon, and H. J. Tomlinson, *registrars of marriages*; and Mr. Geo. and Mrs. Empringham, *master and matron of the workhouse*. The RELIEVING OFFICERS are Thos. Jameson, Wm. Mason, and Chas.. Clay. The REGISTRARS OF BIRTHS AND DEATHS, are Wm. Mason, for *Brigg District*; L. M. Bennett for *Winterton District*; and John Morley for *Barton District*. ☞ COUNTY COURTS.- All the parishes in Brigg District, and all those marked thus \* in Winterton District, are in *Brigg County Court District*; and all the other parishes in the Union are in Barton County Court District.

BRIGG COUNTY COURT, for the 31 parishes, &c., noticed above, is held monthly, at the Police Station. J. G. S. Smith, Esq., is the *judge*; John Hett, Esq., *clerk*; and Jonathan Spring, *bailiff*. The POLICE STATION in Wrawby street, was built in 1845, at the cost of about £2000. It has a house for the superintending constable, cells for prisoners, and accommodation for the County Court and *petty sessions*. The latter are held here every alternate Tuesday, and J. Hett, Esq., is clerk to the magistrates. Brigg *Association for the Prosecution of Felons* has about 60 members, and Mr. Frederick Garfit, is the *clerk*.

CHAPELS, &c.-In the reign of King John, an *Hospital* was founded here by Adam Paynel, subordinate to Selby Abbey, but all traces of it disappeared many years ago. In 1699, a small Chapel of Ease was built in the town, chiefly at the expense of four gentlemen, named Atkinson, Jolland, Benson, and Dempster; three of whom bequeathed property for the benefit of a *lecturer* or *curate*. to be appointed by the trustees of the Free School, and to read prayers once a day, and preach every Sunday, as assistant to the vicar of *Wrawby*, who is virtually both patron and incumbent of the curacy. The *Lectureship*, is held by the *head master of the Free School*, which office has been held many years by the Rev. Charles Cotterill, B.A. The endowment consists of a homestead and about 30 acres of land, at North Keeley, let for £30 per annum, and mostly derived from the bequest of George Jolland, in 1712, and partly from the bequests of Richard Benson and a Mr. Dempster, about 1740. The old chapel having become too small for the increasing population of the town, a handsome *Church* was built in 1841-2, by subscription and a grant from the Church Building Society, at the cost of about £3000, in the Gothic style, with a tower 82 feet high. The stone was given by Sir John Nelthorpe, whose lady laid the first stone, August 16th, 1841, but the church has not been consecrated; being merely licensed as a chapel of ease; though the parish church at Wrawby is about a mile north-east of the town, where a *General Cemetery* is about to be provided for the whole parish, by the *Burial Board*, and half of it will be consecrated. Wrawby Church is already noticed at page 678.

The *Independent Chapel*, in Wrawby street, was built in 1813. The *Wesleyan Chapel*, built in 1810, in lieu of the old one, is a large and handsome building in the Grecian style, of white brick, with stone dressings. In Bridge street is a *Primitive Methodist Chapel*, erected in 1840. There is a *Friends' Meeting House*, in Bigby street, and in Scawby road is a *Roman Catholic Chapel*, with a house for the priest, now the Rev. Henry Swale. The *Wesleyan Reformers* use the *Foresters' Hall* as a place of worship.

The FREE SCHOOL was founded by *Sir John Nelthorpe, Bart.*, who, by will, in 1669, directed his executors to build a "fair school-house and dwelling-house upon his closes, called the Town's-end closes, at Brigg, and endow the intended school with the said closes, and also with all his lands and hereditaments at Horncastle, West Ashby, Ulceby, and Fullsby; the Town's-end closes and the lands at Horncastle and West Ashby, with one moiety of the estate at Fullsby, to be for the maintainance of the *head master*; the lands at Ulceby to be for the support of the usher, and the other moiety of the estate at Fullsby to be expended in providing *lodging, diet, clothes, and books, for as many boys of Legsby and Fullsby*, as the income would maintain in the said school, where the founder directed that they should be educated with the other scholars

until they have learnt to read and write, and attained "good skill in arithmetic." He further directed that all the children of the inhabitants of Brigg, Wrawby, Messingham, North Kelsey, Legsby, Ulceby, Fullsby, West Ashby, Scalby, Broughton, and Castlethorpe, should be taught the Latin, Greek, and Hebrew languages, "to write also and arithmetic," and should have their learning *gratis*; and that all other children sent to the said school from other places, should be taught to read, write, and cast accounts without any charge whatever. The Earl of Yarborough, Sir C. H. J. Anderson, Sir J. Nelthorpe, T. G. Corbett, Esq., the Rev. C. J. Barnard, and C. C. Elwes, Esq., (lord of the manor,) are the trustees. There are two commodious dwelling-houses for the master and usher, and two school rooms. The headmaster's or *Grammar School* has about 30 pupils, and the Usher's School about 80. Besides the free occupation of the Town's-end closes (9A. 2R., worth £30 per annum,) the *master* receives £230 yearly from the rents of the estates at Fullsby, Horncastle, and West Ashby, which are let for about £300 per annum, of which about £200 is derived from the Fullsby estate, one-half of which ought to be appropriated in maintaining poor boys of Fullsby and Legsby, but only four boys are now admitted on this branch of the foundation. The *Usher's Estate at Ulceby* has been increased by allotments awarded to it under an enclosure act, passed in 1824, from about 50A. to upwards of 175A., and from the yearly value of £80 to £240, free which, however, there has to be deducted £157. 10s per annum to pay the interest of £3000 borrowed to pay the enclosure expenses; so that the usher only receives £84 per annum. The founder also bequeathed land at Gainsbro' to pay the expenses of the school trustees, and it is now let for £15 per annum. *Brigg National School*, built about two years ago, is a neat building with room for about 200 pupils. It is already nearly full, and has three pupil teachers. *William Thorold*, about the year 1664, left a yearly rent charge of 40s., out of two cottages here, for apprenticing a poor boy.

BRIGG SAVINGS BANK was established in 1831, and its deposits amount to more than £21,000, belonging to about 900 depositors, and 11 Charitable Societies. *Brigg Reading Society* was established in 1847, and now occupies a building at the bridge end, erected for its use in 1854, at the cost of £200. It has a library of about 900 vols.; and there is also a *News Room* at the Corn Exchange. Here is a *Lodge of Ancient Foresters*, with a numerous list of members, who built a neat Hall in 1850, at the cost of £220. In the town are other Benefit Societies and provident institutions. *Brigg Brass Band* is celebrated for musical talent, being established many years ago, under the patronage of the late Earl of Yarborough.

#### BRIGG DIRECTORY.

The POST OFFICE is in Wrawby street. Mr. Wm. Cressey is the *post-master*. Letters are despatched to London and all parts at 6 10 p.m.; and to Hull, &c, at 7.45 p.m. Mail cart to Winterton, and foot postmen to the surrounding villages. *Money Orders* granted and paid from 10 a.m. till 5 p.m.
